



Maybe you need to sing out loud, maybe you want to sit and be still, maybe you need to pray, maybe you want to soak in His presence; the time is yours to do as you wish.



### **Bishop Rachel's Easter Day sermon**

I suspect that most of us have seen shocking pictures of that destroyed Baltimore Bridge, not only resulting in loss of life but also leaving communities and businesses in a place of deep separation and disconnection. That bridge is for me something of a metaphor for a world which, with technology and travel, seemingly has greater connection than ever before, and yet a world which is blighted by separation and disconnection.

Earlier this month I had the privilege of being in New York at the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women. The concepts of connection and disconnection; relationship and separation, have been strong in my reflections.

It was not easy listening to representatives from Israel, including one of the women who had been held hostage with her son after the horrific atrocities of Hamas on 7 October. The horror of brutal disconnection, imprisonment, separation and trauma was palpable, as was the sense of broken relationship.

A few hours later I sat in a session focused on the women and children of Gaza and listened to the pain, anger and desperation of people who are effectively imprisoned, disconnected and separated from the world around them, resulting in a humanitarian cri-

sis that I suspect most of us cannot bear to dwell on for too long.

The two rooms where the sessions were held were in close proximity, but the emotional and psychological separation and disconnection were immense.

In another session focused on the plight of women and girls in Afghanistan, the words of one woman are etched in my memory as she so forcefully articulated that as women, they have not simply become disconnected from society, but rather they have been erased. Utter separation.

And I'm sure that as we reflect on issues closer to home, in local communities and across the country, we would not find it difficult to give examples of disconnection and separation – whether it be in families and households, or in the challenging issues facing us as a nation and in our local communities.

On Good Friday, I was in a women's prison in Surrey. In my role as Anglican Bishop to Prisons I am deeply aware not only of the disconnection and separation we impose as punishment, but also how issues of disconnection and severed relationship are often so prominent in the stories of those in prison. Now is not the time for me to expand on all this, but it is interesting that our *human* response to the brokenness so often rooted in disconnection and separation, is *further* separation and disconnection, whether it be the young person removed from school or the person sent to prison.

Not so with *God's* work of restoration and transformation.

In that prison chapel on Friday amid those women's stories of disconnection, severed relationship and separation; there was a deep sense of entering into Christ's pain and death as he hung on the cross in a place of utter desolation, and separation not only from friends and followers who had fled, but even from God the Father. So as the world's brokenness and sin (past, present and future) was held between those outstretched arms, Jesus cried out in agony 'my God, my God why have you forsaken me.' In this place of disconnection, darkness covers the land. The light goes out. And in that bleakest of hours it looks as if hope has been cut off and separation has had the final word.

Perhaps it feels like that to you as you look out at the world through the lens of the media and social media, and as we look at our own lives and the lives of those around us.

Yet, in that prison chapel, even as we knelt at the foot of the cross, there was also a deep sense of hope, and a clinging on to the truth that in Christ's outstretched arms on the cross was

interesting that our *human* response to the most overwhelming and generous the brokenness so often rooted in disconnection and separation, is will ever be.

> And so it is that Mary Magdalene comes to the tomb three days after Christ's burial. she is once more in a place of brokenness and disconnection. In her grief she is cut off from Jesus whom she loves so deeply.

Then she sees that the stone has been rolled away from the entrance to the tomb, and in her confusion and distress runs to tell the other disciples, and so it is that John and Peter run to the tomb.

And then Mary looks in and sees an angel, yet in her grief and confusion she cannot connect with the truth. It is only when Jesus speaks her name that she recognises the risen Christ, and there is reconnection and a sense of restored relationship.

[Incidentally after my time in New York I rejoice even more deeply that the first witness to Christ's resurrection was a woman who was once shunned and separated from her community but who had discovered restoration, dignity and worth, through Jesus Christ's love and counter-cultural relationship of connection].

Jesus tells Mary not to hold on to him – because true reconnection with God and neighbour and the world is going to be something far greater than physically holding on to the person of Jesus. Restoration is not going to be about life going back to how it was. Indeed, those words of Jesus to Mary about him ascending are really important in God's great work of reconnection and restored relationship.

In 50 days' time, if you stay the course, we will celebrate the Feast of Pentecost (just 10 days after Ascension Day and the mystery of Jesus leaving the earth and returning to be with God the Father); and we will celebrate the amazing mystery of God's Holy Spirit coming to proclaim what God has done in Jesus be with us in every place and at every time (connection mysteriously be undone, even as we live amid the poured out in abundance).

And it is after this that the apostle Peter, speaks those words which we heard in our first reading from the book of Acts. Peter, who in a place of fear before Christ's crucifixion. denied even knowing him, but then after Jesus' resurrection is restored to relationship with him. And then sometime after Jesus Christ's ascension, and the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, Peter is able to say, "I truly understand that God shows no partiality... 'that everyone who believes in Jesus Christ receives forgiveness of sins.'

God's heart is for re-connection and restored relationship with *all* people: Children, young people, adults;

people of every age, background, story; those who see themselves as insiders and those who feel separated disconnected. ALL people. No and partiality. This was shocking news, not least for faithful Jews. (Go home and read the first part of Acts Chapter 10).

God's promise of reconnection – to reconcile all things to God – is not on a par with President Biden promising to rebuild a devastated bridge. It is far far greater - even beyond our imagining – as on this Easter day we Christ and wonderfully what cannot mess and pain of this world's separation and disconnection. In this Eucharist we will proclaim that 'Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again'. Perfect relationship will be restored, with God, with one another, and with all of creation.

That doesn't mean that the pain of disconnection and separation that we see close at hand and far away, is any less painful. Indeed, if we have followed Jesus Christ to the foot of the cross and beyond to the empty tomb and proclaimed today, 'Alleluia he is risen', then we have also said 'yes' to entering ever more deeply into those places of separation and disconnection, as followers of Christ who live and speak hope even

our beautiful yet broken world.

even through our tears and in the darkest places.

In this Eucharist as we stretch out our hands and open our hearts to the love, mercy and forgiveness of God, the *future* fulfilment of God's restorative work and all that God has done in *the past* through Christ, are met together in the *present* as we are fed in bread and wine.

When you leave the Cathedral today those huge glass doors are marked with the keys of St Peter, because of course this cathedral takes his name. And may those of us, who like Peter have said "yes" to following Jesus Christ, step through those doors refreshed and restored as Easter-hope people, desiring to share the connecting love and hope of the risen Christ, not least among all those who feel separated and disconnected in

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Alleluia, Christ is risen.

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

For those with big questions about **death**, **dying** and **funerals**, having someone to talk to can be invaluable.



#### St. George's GraveTalk & Grief Café.



### Good News

After so many reports of accidents, I am very happy to share the news that Paul has at long last been accepted to be a Guide Dog owner. His journey began years ago when he applied for another dog, following his last dog being taken from him. He was rejected twice, due to his balance. Then, last Spring, he began Fit for Life classes at the community centre to improve his balance.

Following a phone call made by Caroline Stone at Brockworth Surgery, he had his first phone call from Guide Dogs for the Blind. This was followed by a second, longer phone call and consequently he has had training sessions with a Guide Dog trainer. Sally came every 1 or 2 weeks training Paul. Before Christmas she told Paul he was ready for his final assessment when it would be decided if he was a suitable candidate for a dog. However, having been told this would be after Christmas, it was April 2<sup>nd</sup> before this last test took place. Paul was told that his tester would go to a team meeting on Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> April and a decision would be made. Then eventually at 5pm on 11<sup>th</sup> April, that phone call came and he was told that he had been accepted to go on the list for a dog. Unfortunately, due to Covid, the training of these wonderful dogs was held up and there is a year-long waiting list. But at least he is on the list now.

When his time comes, he will have to go to Learnington Spa for 2 weeks training with his allocated dog. He will stay in a hotel and training will be given from there. Then hopefully he will be able to bring his dog home and continue with another two weeks training from home. His trainer will come daily to learn the routes Paul has been walking and then he will be on his own. When he had his other two dogs, he was checked on at intervals until he was confident enough to continue alone.

I cannot praise Guide Dogs enough, and hopefully in a year or so, you will spot Paul walking with confidence around Brockworth with his dog.

### A WRETCH LIKE ME

Dear Readers, you will recall my dissertation on John Newton and his very popular hymn Amazing Grace in the April Magazine. The opening lines of the Hymn," how sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me". are the subject of today's essay.

You may not have heard of Lauren Tally, a southern gospel singer, who was the lead soprano in the Tally family trio composed of Roger and Debra Talley, and their daughter Lauren Talley. Performing over 20 years, they have made appearances all over the world. At the end of 2020 Roger and Debra retired as singers and Lauren began singing full time as a soloist at the start of 2022.

Lauren took the line "A Wretch like me" and composed her own hymn, a gospel song. With its heartfelt lyrics and soul-stirring melody, the hymn speaks of the transformative power of God's grace and redemption.

"A Wretch Like Me," reflects the humble realisation of the singer that she was once lost and undeserving of God's mercy and forgiveness. However, through the sacrificial death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, she believes that she has been redeemed and set free from the chains of sin and shame.

The lyrics of the song convey a profound sense of gratitude and awe for God's amazing grace. It acknowledges that we, as human beings, are flawed and sinful, but despite our shortcomings, God extends His love and forgiveness to us. It is a reminder that no matter how unworthy we may feel, God's grace is sufficient to save and transform us. The song's message aligns with the central theme of Christianity – the redemptive work of Jesus Christ on the cross. The lyrics capture the essence of the Gospel, emphasising the undeserved nature of God's grace and the transformative power of his love.

the man of sorrows bore my grief,


and now I stand in victory saved by his grace I am one of his redeemed.

### THE MIND OF GOD

Dear Readers, you will have read the much-published articles concerning the Gloucester Rugby Player, Ed Slater and his diagnosis of Motor Neurone disease that follows Scottish Rugy Player, Dodie Weir dying from the same disease. But, the most famous case of MND has got to be Stephen Hawking who was an English theoretical physicist, cosmologist, and author who was director of research at the Centre for Theoretical Cosmology at the Cambridge. Between 1979 and 2009, he was the Lucasian Professor of Mathematics at Cambridge, widely viewed as one of the most prestigious academic posts in the world.

In 1963, at age 21, Hawking was diagnosed with an early-onset slowprogressing form of motor neurone disease that gradually, over decades, paralysed him. After the loss of his speech, he communicated through a speech-generating device initially through use of a handheld switch, and eventually by using a single cheek muscle living to 75 years of age.

Today's essay is based on a famous quotation from Stephen Hawking: "If we do discover a theory of everything it would be the ultimate triumph of human reason—for then we would truly know the Mind of God."

So, what does the Bible say about the Mind of God? We must go to 1 Corinthians 2.16 I quote "Who has known the mind of the Lord so as to instruct him, but we have the mind of Christ". No one can know the thoughts of God except God's own Spirit. To know the mind of God, one must fully understand Gods word. The Holy Spirit is also of immense help in knowing the mind of God. The one who knows a man best is his spirit, and in the same way, the one who knows God best is His Holy Spirit.

How can we have the mind of God? How can we think with God in relation to our life and situations?

In Isaiah 55:8-9 it says "For My thoughts are not your thoughts, Nor are your ways My ways," says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways, And My thoughts than your thoughts." "For to us God revealed these thoughts through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches all things, even the depths of God. For whom among men knows the thoughts of a man except the spirit of the man which is in him? Even so the thoughts of God no one knows except the Spirit of God. Paul explained that the only way for man to know the mind of God is for the Holy Spirit to reveal it. Today, that revelation is found in the Bible (2 Timothy 3:16).

Finally, and back to Stephen Hawking, will we ever know the theory of everything? If so, we may then know the mind of God.

Big Mission Weekend, with the Archbishop of Canterbury

Over the May Bank Holiday, Friday 24 to Sunday 26 May, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Revd Justin Welby, will be coming to the Diocese to join in with our mission and vision.

Friday 24 May

Archbishop Justin will start by having breakfast with farmers in the North Cotswolds. They will have some big conversations about issues affecting farmers, environmental considerations and care for creation.

He'll then meet children at two of our Gloucestershire schools, answering their questions and joining in with singing and worship on an environmental theme.

After lunch, he'll visit a church where the community have set up a thriving café and shop and get to know some of the team who volunteer there, as well as being trained up to make a delicious latte.

At 5pm, Archbishop Justin will be joining Evening Prayer at St John Baptist Church in Cirencester. All are welcome to this service.

Dinner will be at The Grace Network, which supports social enterprises that reinvest profits into their local communities. Guests will have the chance to put their questions to the Archbishop and find out more about how his faith has shaped the person he is today.

Saturday 25 May

The day begins with a service of morning prayer and a Messy Church session in Gloucester. The Archbishop will have a go at some crafts, singing and chatting with the children and families who worship here.

He'll set off on a prayer walk through Gloucester, stopping for an ice cream on the way to chat to some local Christian business owners and see how their faith plays out in their business. He will be popping into a not-for-profit community café, before getting a steam-punk angle on Gloucester's Tall Ships Festival.

At 1pm to 3.30pm, the Archbishop will be involved in a community fun day run by Sportily, full of lots of sports and activities, at Longford Skate Park. Come along for a coffee and an ice cream and practise your map-reading skills in our treasure hunt.

As a diocese, we believe that people deserve to live in homes that are safe, stable, sustainable, social and satisfying. The Archbishop will find out more about how the Diocese is locally supporting better housing provision.

Young people in Cheltenham have invited the Archbishop to come and join in their regular worship session and then he will end the day with a meal with partners from across the diocese. Bishop Rachel will interview Archbishop Justin and there will be a question-andanswer session about Christian faith and mission.

#### Sunday 26 May

Archbishop Justin will travel to Tidenham in the Forest of Dean to join in worship, which is open to the local community.

The weekend ends with a celebration diocesan Eucharist (Holy Communion) service at Gloucester Cathedral at 3pm. Please do come and join us for this joyful service of celebration and thankfulness.
